Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been so lovely to have all the children settled into school this term, seeing them all undertaking brilliant learning activities and thoroughly enjoying themselves in the excitement of understanding new things. As you will see from the school summaries below our schools continue to be totally individual in their approach, offering an enormous range of wonderful learning experiences. I have asked them to select just one thing to focus on, as this Newsletter seemed to have taken on a life of its own because they all wanted to show the diversity of experiences our children had been party to! I would like to take this opportunity to really thank all those parents, people in the community, staff in schools and as part of the Central Team, volunteers, governors and Trustees etc, etc.... for all their support, especially through the last two years of pandemic. It hasn't been easy for anyone and we have seen everything from issues of mental health, shortage of funds and food, to loss and bereavement and yet everyone has done their best for each other. Staff in particular have worked so hard for the school family and community, so a massive thank you from the Link Academy Trust. The last weeks of this term have been a little more difficult as we have had some small spikes in Covid outbreaks and we have not always had the staff coverage we would like. We are not alone, many schools are suffering in the same way and some have even had to reduce the days children can attend- there are no supply teachers available! We continue to do our best to ensure we deliver excellent education and exciting opportunities and to this end have secured a Teacher and a Higher Level Teaching Assistant to support schools as necessary. They are not attached to a school but go into our schools when there is a need and significant periods of absence need coverage, this will be a real bonus to the excellent running of schools. This term the teaching staff have focussed on delivering a very progressive, skills based curriculum, in line with the new Ofsted Framework and have been working together across the Trust in Subject Leadership groups to share best practice and support each other. This too has been highly successful and has led to consistent quality first teaching in all our schools. The Executive Improvement Team have had the opportunity to go into schools to monitor and support where this has been needed. Through their coaching and mentoring a highly successful programme has been implemented which has resulted in best practice being fully embedded in schools. I am really proud of the developments that have taken place, particularly for some schools.

This term's work has been reflected in a clear growth in pupil's confidence and progress, not to mention numbers. The Trust has grown from 1,234 pupils in September to 1,388 currently, Pre-school numbers alone rising by 41 pupils and that is before our January intake. I am really proud of the way Academy Heads continually work together to share all they do, it is such a bonus of this Trust with 'like' schools all being able to forge forward through an honest and trusting approach- giving each other support to be the best they can be.

I hope you all have an amazing Christmas, please make the most of your family time. Let's hope the weather is kind to us and we all enjoy the holiday break. Thank you all once again for your amazing support

### **Bearnes Primary School**

An artist in residence, Bridget Arnold, joined us for our first arts week where we studied the natural world. We gained a real insight into how an artist begins and the strategies she uses for creating Sun prints a method of using cyanotype chemicals and sunshine to capture plants and natural objects. The children had a fantastic time working using plants that they had gathered themselves on walks. They enjoyed watching the process magically unfold and transform their plants into artistic creations. Our Exhibition & Open Evening of Art work took place in October ~ a great opportunity to share and celebrate fantastic, artistic creativity. It also generated interest from new families, all of whom came back for a second visit.

We've ended the term with some fantastic Christmas performances. I never tire of our trips to Bethlehem! 

### Widecombe-in-the-Moor Primary School



During the autumn term, we have been using our Forest School skills to further our learning using the outdoor environment. We would like to thank the Friends of Widecombe Primary School for gifting us with a trained Forest School teacher and to local parents for allowing us to use their land. Our youngest class, Webburn, learnt many essential Forest School skills, such as using hand drills and bow saws, and put this to good use in their Design Technology lesson to design and make appealing wooden necklaces. They also used leaf recognition in maths to develop their number bonds.

Lower Dart have enriched their literacy and Roman topic by researching the history of pigments and dyes before making their own natural dyes using lichen, alder nuts, gorse flowers and bracken around the forest fire. Upper Dart have used their outdoor learning sessions to further their topic and design and technology. They have followed ancient Roman recipes, making Posca and Punic porridge over the fire. They also designed Roman coins in the classroom, made clay moulds then melted pewter to cast their own coins at the forest school site.


