Dear parents and carers,

This has more than ever before been a year of challenging and changing situations, as well as some real achievements and improvements. The autumn term saw us start the academic year wondering whether the pandemic would again be closing schools, luckily it didn't, but we had many staff and pupils who were very poorly. Despite this, our schools ensured digital learning was in place and the staff worked really hard to build a skills progressive curriculum to support our pupils fill any gaps in their learning, making up for the time they had been out of school. The children themselves were brilliant and embraced being back in the classroom. Attendance across the Trust has been in excess of 95% in the majority of schools, which reflects the commitment so important to ensure all children have a good grasp of the appropriate concepts as foundations for life-long learning.

The summer term has seen the children much more settled and relaxed as all the usual summer activities start to return, including sports days, leavers celebrations and trips & visits. They all help to give learning an exciting twist!

SATs testing returned for the first time since 2019 and all the children took it in their stride. Although results were a little down on the 2019 results, the picture was the same nationally and this was only to be expected given the circumstances of that period. Ofsted also inspected three of our schools this term, they remain Good and the Inspection reports reflect significant strengths. We expect them to return next academic year as further schools fall into the inspection window and I am confident they will continue to find good practice, as staff across all our schools 'go the extra mile', some examples include:

- Anna Neville at Landscove has been driving the Global Neighbours project, which aims to increase pupil's
 understanding of the root cause of poverty and injustice, as well as engaging and empowering pupils as agents of
 change. This has led to the school not just receiving the Bronze Award, but also being well on the way to the silver
 level. See the website and Mid Devon Advertiser.
- Brittany Harris in the kitchen at Harbertonford has devised a DT Cooking programme for every pupil across the school which she will help to deliver, resulting in every child producing their own Recipe Book built up throughout their time in school. I can't wait to see them!
- Becky Hawling at Bearnes' completed her National Professional Qualification as a Senior Leader and achieved Distinction in the two different components of the programme, not an easy achievement at all!
- Becky Humphreys and her team have been superb in supporting our special needs pupils through the Inclusion and Improvement Hub (IIH) work, offering therapeutic courses and assisting all schools with high quality bespoke provision for pupils that need assistance in this way.
- Matt, our Deputy CEO has worked tirelessly to continue to improve the school estates, including an extensive
 redecoration programme this summer. Other larger projects will be delivered including a new roof at Bearnes, a small
 extension at Stoke Gabriel with other projects just awaiting funding application outcomes. Matt's team supports all
 heads throughout the year so they can focus on teaching and learning.

These are just a few examples of the dedication of our staff. Every school has a huge number of 'champions' who ensure the whole Trust benefit from their expertise. Next year will see new staff joining the Link, including new Academy Heads at Morchard Bishop - Sam Butler, Widecombe in the Moor - Anthony Arnold and Hennock - Chris Martin who have already been into schools to work with staff to ensure a smooth start in September. We also have a number of early career teachers joining us and the Link will be providing a comprehensive induction and support programme for these members of staff to ensure their success. It only leaves me to say a heartfelt thank you to all staff, trustees, governors, pupils, parents and our fantastic local communities for all their support. I hope you have a lovely summer break and I will look forward to seeing everyone return in September.

Bearnes Primary School
